Glad to see that Nancy Welles is much better and hope that continues. Was nice to see she could make it to the picnic.



It being August, I got to thinking about Augustus Caesar, the first Roman emporer (Julius Caesar was his great uncle), for whom the month is named. By means of long and complicated politics and war, he created the Roman Empire, which lasted for 500 years, give or take.

In his time, the most important gold mine was Las Médulas in Spain. It was actually a strip mine at which the Romans used large quantities of water (via aqueducts, no less) to undermine the landscape—the technique was called *ruina montium*, wrecking the mountains.

It was mined for 250 years; at its peak it produced around 7 (US) tons of gold a year. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Directions to old Litchfield Litchfield Elementary School in Litchfield is on Cotton Hollow Rd or SR 1056 - Thanks to Inga Wells (minor changes by your Editor)

If you take Rt 220 South from points north:

I recommend: Take Route 220 south to the Athens exit. Take Pine St. to Main St, and turn right at that intersection light. Go on Main St. (for 0.9 miles) until you see Gannon Insurance/Sam's Restaurant on the corners of Susquehanna St. to get across the river. This is a left turn. There is also the little Teaga Park and the Athens Clinic opposite the turn. Once you are over the river, there is a 4 way stop. Go straight, this is Front St. and will become Cotton Hollow Rd., marked as SR 1056 on maps. The speed limit on these county roads is usually 45 miles an hour. Go 2.2 miles on Front St. You'll come to a Y fork, take the left fork toward Windham Center, You'll see the school crossing sign after 2.3 miles. The school is on your left. At the black top parking lot, behind the school, near the playground, is a dirt road that will lead you to the picnic area. Go slow, potholes!

This former school facility is between Evans and Hill Rd. The next building, going east, is the fire department and you can Google that Litchfield Township Fire Department as 2902 Cotton Hollow Rd, if nothing else works for your GPS.

If you take **Rt 220 North from points south** and turn onto Rt 199 (this will turn into Main St) you'll make a right turn onto Susquehanna St.

Once you are over the river, there is a 4 way stop. Go straight, this is Front St. and will become Cotton Hollow Rd., marked as SR 1056 on maps. The speed limit on these county roads is usually 45 miles

an hour. Go 2.2 miles on Front St. You'll come to a Y fork, take the left fork toward Windham Center, you'll see the school crossing sign after 2.3 miles. The school is on your left. At the black top parking lot, behind the school, near the playground, is a dirt Rd that will lead you to the picnic area. Go slow, potholes!

This former school facility is between Evans and Hill Rd. The next building, going east, is the fire department and you can Google that Litchfield Township Fire Department as 2902 Cotton Hollow Rd, if nothing else works for your GPS.

Directions from Route 187: Nichols, NY to Wysox PA. The mileage from Route 187 (Windham Center) to the school is 5.6 miles. Cotton Hollow Rd is marked with a sign "10 miles to Athens".

Anyone **going cross-lots**, there are connecting country roads, like MacAfee and the N. Rome Rd. There is good cell phone reception at the site.
