Directions to Satterlee (July 17th)

Che-Hanna picnic directions to the Sayre Area School, Elementary School in Litchfield and their Satterlee Creek Environmental Center, on Cotton Hollow Rd or SR 1056:

From the Valley, Route 220, Route 17 (I-86):

- Take Route 220 south to the Athens exit.
- Take Pine St. to Main St, and turn right at that intersection light.
- Go on Main St. (for 0.9 miles) until you see Gannon Insurance/Sam's Restaurant on the corner of Susquehanna St. to get across the river. This is a left turn. There is the little Teaoga Park and the Athens Clinic opposite the turn. (If you take Route 220 North from points south and turn onto Route 199 at Greens Landing, you'll make a right turn onto Susquehanna St.)
- Once you are over the river, there is a 4 way stop. Go straight, this is Front St. and will become Cotton Hollow Rd. Go 2.2 miles on Front St.
- You'll come to a Y fork, take the left fork toward Windham Center.
- You'll see the school crossing sign after 2.3 miles. The school is on your left.
- At the black top parking lot, behind the school, near the playground, is a dirt Rd that will lead you to the picnic area. Go slow, potholes! This former school facility is between Evans and Hill Rd.
- The next building, going east, is the fire department and you can google Litchfield Township Fire Department as 2902 Cotton Hollow Rd, if nothing else works for your GPS.

Directions from Route 187:

• Nichols, NY to Wysox, PA. The mileage from Route 187 in Windham Center to the school is 5.6 miles. Cotton Hollow Rd is marked with a sign "10 miles to Athens".

Parents can decide if their children will be using sand paper only or the carving tools. Parents may opt to use the Dremel-type tool and they must wear protective eye wear. There are some hand drills the younger kids may use. To finish the carving, we use warmed bees wax or shoe polish. If you have allergies, please use the dust masks.

At the June meeting, the kids made volcanos and "lava lamps". It became a bit too hot to work more with the clay and to learn about igneous rocks. July is scheduled for learning about metamorphic rocks.

AFMS Code of Ethics

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner's permission.
- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations, or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind—fences, signs, buildings.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires in designated or safe places only, and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material—matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field trip leaders and this in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and other purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use "Good Outdoor Manners", and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and public "image" of rockhounds everywhere.

Geologic Time Periods

Lots and lots of research has gone into understanding our geologic past. To help people when they're talking about Earth's geological record, names for time periods have been more or less agreed upon, so they can avoid always talking in numbers of years.

Earth's history is divided into *Eons*, which are divided into *Eras*, which are divided into *Periods*, which are divided into *Epochs*, which are divided into *Ages*, which are divided into *Chrons*.

Not every category has all the possible subcategories; we know much more about recent periods than old ones because they're so much easier to investigate.

Also, oddly, because so much time passed before the Earth got interesting (IE, life arose), the earliest eons are gathered into the Precambrian *Supereon*, but the latest eon, Phanerozoic, hasn't been put into another *Supereon*.

The whole thing can be best expressed in graphics or a tree, but as an example, the Calabrian Age (from 1.8 to .78 million years ago) is in the Pleistocene Epoch (2.58 to .0117 MYA), which is in the Quaternary Period (2.58 MYA to present), which is in the Cenozoic Era (66 MYA to present), which is in the Phanerozoic Eon (541 MYA to present).

And, the latest: a potential new Epoch, the Anthropocene, to correspond to when human activities began to have significant geological effects.
